AMERICAN ACADEMY OF GOLD FOIL OPERATORS

Minutes of Board Meeting February 1984

On Wednesday, February 15, 1984, the Board of Directors of the American Academy of Gold Foil Operators met in the Consulate VI-VII of the Westin Hotel, Chicago, Illinois.

The members in attendance were: Dr. William J. Roberts, Dr. Ronald K. Harris, Dr. Nelson W. Rupp, Dr. Julian J. Thomas, Dr. Norman C. Ferguson, Dr. Allan G. Osborn, Dr. Richard McCoy, Dr. Chester Schultz, Dr. Chester J. Gibson, Dr. Richard V. Tucker and Dr. James P. Vernetti. The meeting was called to order by the President, Dr. Wm. J. Roberts.

The minutes of the Annual Meeting were adopted as they were published in the Gold Leaf, with one correction, the addition of the name of Dr. Nelson W. Rupp in the list of members present. The financial report, treasurer's report and 1984 budget were read and approved.

Unfinished Business

Student Membership. The secretary reported ten members in the new student membership category. The application form and membership information sheet prepared by Dr. Ronald K. Harris were approved by the Board. The secretary's office was advised to have forms printed and to mail forms and information sheets to Chairman of the Operative Department of each of the dental universities each September. Student members will be invited to join the Academy as Associate Members upon their graduation.

Dr. Charles M. Stebner Instruments. It was reported by Dr. Ronald K. Harris that the gold foil instruments donated to the Academy by Dr. Stebner were presently in use by graduate students of Indiana University School of Dentistry.

Williams-Bonner Proposal. The proposal made by R. V. Williams, Jr. and Dr. Phillip Bonner relating to a public relations program for direct gold was discussed by the Board. The feeling was a need for further study. The proposal will be brought before the group again at the October meeting.

Meetings for 1984-1987. A letter from Dr. Steve Reese, of Emory University School of Dentistry, who will be hosting the Annual Meeting of the Academy in October 1984. It was decided that details of this meeting will be left to the program committee, Dr. William Roberts, Dr. Ronald K. Harris and Dr. Nelson W. Rupp. This group will be visiting Atlanta in April to complete details for this event.

It was announced that Dr. Greg Smith and Dr. Richard McCoy are working on plans for the 1986 meeting to be held in Florida.

The secretary's office announced that Colorado will host the 1987 meeting. Colorado won the vote on the mailout ballot



FROM THE OPERATIVE ACADEMY



Gold Foil presentations at the recent meeting of the Operative Academy included a section under "Helpful Hints:" from Dr. Gregory Smith of Florida, and a table clinic from the Winnipeg Ferreir Society demonstrating Gold foils, Porcelain Inlays, and cast Gold Inlays—entitled "Operative Dentistry for the fun of it". (The work presented included work by Dr. Norman Ferguson, Dr. Allan Osborn, and Dr. Richard Tucker).

PROPOSED FOIL COURSE

A proposal is presently under study whereby funding would be made available to run introductory and more advanced courses in Gold Foil at Northwestern University.

The courses would be primarily for Dental Faculty members to enable them to acquire sufficient, and comfortable, expertise to teach gold foil in their respective schools.

The commercial organizations involved include Williams Gold, American Dental, Hygenic, Ivory, Hu Friedy, Thompson Dental and Suter Dental; and the professional organizations American Academy of Gold Foil Operators and Academy of Operative Dentistry.

Dr. James Vernetti Visits Eastern Seaboard

At the behest of the New England Study Club AAGFO Special Clinician, Dr. Jim Vernetti completed a highly successful educational tour through the Eastern Seaboard, in the late fall of 1983.

The presentations, made at Tufts, Boston College, Harvard, Dalhousie (Canada), Buffalo and Connecticut, all received very positive reviews from Faculty, and more particularly from the Students involved.

What is happening to our Legacy of Gold Foil?

Each day's mail brings suggestions that you and I are not practicing dentistry the way we should. One letter implies that their laboratory is superior and cheaper than all others including yours. Another letter suggests that your business procedures belong to the ages. Other information received implies that unless you sell your soul to work for the company store, you will be left behind. I do not believe any of these, or the countless other suggestions that imply only quantity is important, not quality.

I went into dentistry because I wanted to do for people what Dr. Ralph Boelsche did for me. I entered dentistry to provide quality treatment for patients whose lives are important to me. I am interested in their wants and fears, their successes, and their disappointments. I was given a legacy of caring about patients and letting the numbers take care of themselves. I was given a legacy of providing the best dentistry that my mind and hands can produce—not perfect—but giving it my best attempt.

You know who your dental heroes are. You know who stimulated you to go into this great profession. You know the pride that you feel when completing a procedure and thinking to yourself, "I wish he could see this."

Enamel is sacred; dentine is sacred; pulp is sacred; gingiva is sacred; bone is sacred. More than any of these, however, the trust in

you by your patient is the most sacred of all. That is the legacy given to each of us practicing today. That is the legacy which must not die with us. We must pass it on. We must do for someone else what was done for us.

For us to survive the onslaught of those who would cheapen our profession, of those who would thrill to see us belonging to a trade, of those who would gain at the public's loss, we must continue the tradition and pass on the legacy.

I challenge you to choose a younger dentist to help. Invite that dentist to visit your office. Indicate your willingness to help when problems occur. Go to the meetings together. Send that dentist some patients. (Remember how many dentists did that for you? Let him know that quality lasts and that he can have a fine practice when his main concern is how well he finished a procedure, not how fast.

If we pass on our great heritage, our legacy of quality and caring, then our profession will remain intact. Our heroes took the time to pass the legacy to us. What wonderful benefits we share because of them. Our responsibility is to pass on to our younger colleagues those same values. Dentistry—a noble legacy—pass it on.
