Fifteen clinical operations were performed by component club members at the School of Dentistry, University of Washington.

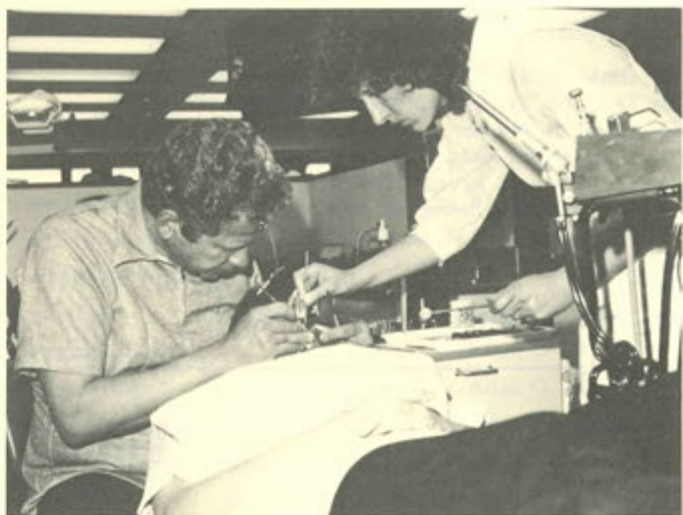
The afternoon's recreation, on the golf course at Broadmoor Country Club in Seattle, and the trap shooting north of Seattle were

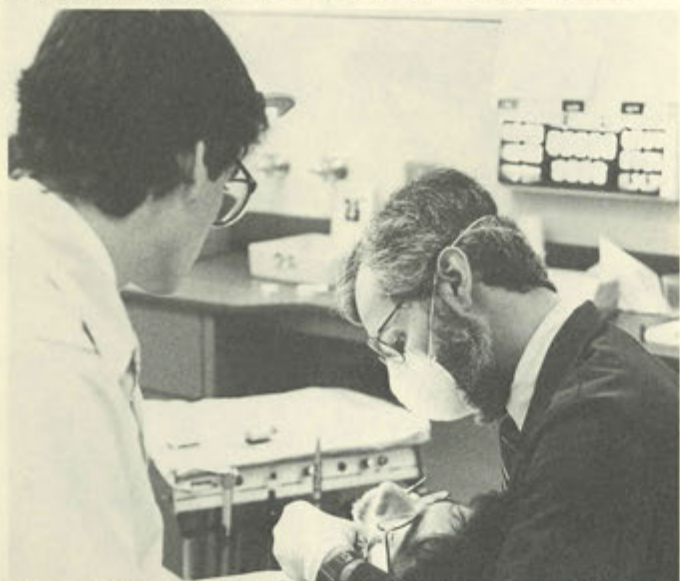
# GOLD FOIL COURSE COMES TO FRUITION

The Continuing Education Course in direct gold restorations held at Northwestern University Dental School June 11 through 14, 1985, was very successful. The course was sponsored by The American Academy of Gold Foil Operators, The Academy of Operative Dentistry, The Williams Gold Refining Co., The Hygenic Corporation, American Dental Manufacturing Co., and Suter Dental Manufacturing Co.

The instructors for the course were Dr. Ronald K. Harris of Indianapolis, Indiana and Dr. James P. Vernetti. These two highly motivated veterans provided intense and inspired "hands-on" instruction throughout the entire four days. At the completion of the course the eight participants (all faculty members) had completed 30 Class I and V gold foil restorations on patients as well as the restorations on extracted teeth. This was solid testimony to the enthusiasm and dedication to both the "students" and the instructors.
