We feel proud of the dedicated men in our academy who make the effort to provide education through study clubs, classrooms and courses for those that are interested and seek it. This is our obligation.


It will be a good meeting in Seattle next year. I hope it will be well attended. Meanwhile, if you have any concerns or recommendations for the Academy, please contact me.

Dr. Ted Ramage demonstrated rubber dam techniques covering a range of applications from basic to complex, illustrating each step with beautifully prepared slides to demonstrate techniques and the various gingival retractors along with the manner of their modification and placement.




Dr. Chester Gibson showed a range of situations where gold foil was inimicable as a modality for restoring damaged teeth. Particularly accented were the margin repairs and contact replacement where a Class II slot may provide a simple answer to a difficult problem.



Dr. Richard Tucker gave a concise description of the Ferrier Study Club approach to the Class V gold foil, elaborating upon subtle details and potential pit falls whose careful observance would consistently lead to superior end results.



Mr. Clyde Ingersoll from Williams Gold discussed the gold restoratives from the metallurgical stand point and following a short paper opened the floor to questions from the audience which proved both lively and informative.



Dr. Matt Panar explored the biological relationship between restorative dentistry and gingival tissue. The paper was accompanied by excellent histological slides which showed clearly and concisely the genuinely and healthy attachment apparatus in the presence of gold foil.

His birth in 1915 took Canada's attention away from World War I. Then at the age of three, when the armistice was signed, he vowed to become a dentist, bringing great cheer to his dentist father. From that moment on, a champion was born.

Who would have thought then that the little toddler would later write for the journal Science or Gegenbauer's Morphologisches Jahrbuch. That he would work with titanium implants in the seventies, writing with Karagianes and others in 1981. If Ian's Mother had known that the little fellow would become the champion pole vaulter of all Canada, she probably would have changed the height of his playpen.

Well, from a small start, Ian went on to not only to achieve but to give back to his profession a full measure of his time and ability. His honors include a masters degree in economics, a fellowship from Claremont Men's College, and a Ph.D. in anatomy, achieved after six years of work at the University of London.

From our dental standpoint, his work literally creating our **Journal of**Operative Dentistry and securing it's place among "scholarly journals"
was a major triumph. As its editor for ten years, he carried it to a level

where it is now used routinely as a reference in other professional journals. Ian has demonstrated gold foil techniques in England at the Royal Dental Hospital, at the University of Washington and for years as a study club member in Seattle.

Those who know his character well are delighted by his Irish wit and "pixie-like" sense of humor. It Has been said that a small "turf" fire burns in his heart. Of course without his wife Mary's wonderful understanding and support, he could have probably ended up chirping in a tree instead of "flying with eagles". She stood by him through periods of Dixieland music, primate lab experiments (where even monkeys hate to lose their teeth), CAIC membership and Restorative Academy meetings. Each one a test for a normal, attractive intelligent woman.

All in all Ian has been blessed but he has returned a blessing to this academy and to dentistry far beyond the average.

There are many deserving people who through the years have contributed greatly to our academy's unique and superior operating standards but none more so than Ian.

Gold Foil Exposure in Japan

In mid-November, 1988, Gold Foil activity made its appearance in Japan in two places: at the Tokyo Dental College and at the Practical Gnathology Institute.

The former took place where a lecture was delivered to approximately 30 Operative Staff of this large modern institution (established in 1890 and re-built after the war) some 30 miles North of downtown Tokyo.

The Academic Dean and Chairman of Operative Dentistry, Dr. Tatsu Ishikawa, and former chairman of the department, Dr. Kazuyu Takahashi were most cordial hosts (Dr. Takahashi is a member of AAGFO and translated Harold Schnepper/Robert Kinzer Gold Foil manual, into Japanese). Following a lecture, the staff had opportunity to condense gold

into a plastic block.

The following week a formal continuing Education course was conducted at the Practical Gnathologic Institute under the direction of Dr. Hajime Suya. In the early 1970's Dr. Suya spent 2 years in graduate training at Loma Linda before returning to Japan. His post graduate training center, which stresses excellence and quality serves dentists throughout Japan as well as other countries in the far east.

Students received instruction by lecture followed by placing Goldent restorations in extracted teeth. Dr. Suya interpreted English into Japanese and assisted in laboratory instruction. Enthusiasm ran high and a definite interest toward gold foil was readily observed.

C-E Course in Canada

Under the organization and supervision of Peter Bradley D.D.S., Victoria, B.C., a continuing education course in Direct Gold was conducted at the Sutherland clinic of the University of British Columbia Dental School in Vancouver. Lloyd Baum D.M.D. served as the mentor of the 6 students during the 2 days (October 30, November 1, 1988).

The course was clinical in nature with each participant seeing patients and placing Goldent restorations each of the 4 half days.

Fortunately all of the participants possessed a good working knowledge of the rubber dam and were adequately equipped to operate in a strange environment. Moreover a good selection of patients were provided.

All types of lesions (class I, II, III, V) were treated. With the small group, cross observation of each others procedures permitted a great deal of learning to take place during the 2 days.

Perhaps the greates benefit from this 2 days encounter was the self image and self confidence that resulted. The old addage, "Nothing succeeds quite like success", took on new meaning among the participants. Special thanks goes to Peter Bradley and Kevin Spence, local arrangements, for making this meeting possible.
